





## | PRESIDENT MESSAGE

Although it seems like Covid-19 has consumed all of our focus, it has only impacted the last two weeks of our reporting year and will significantly impact the coming year. Much more will be said about the fantastic role the United Way of PEI played in providing leadership and oversight in that time of crisis in next year's report.

The United Way of PEI's mission is to improve the lives of Islanders and build community by engaging individuals and mobilizing collective action. Throughout 2019, our organization was able to live up to the mission through leadership and program development directly impacting our local communities.

**Numerous Staff and Board members participated in the Day of Caring on June 7, 2019.** This day brought together over 80 volunteers to help with 7 projects across the Island. Day of Caring allows us to roll up our sleeves while introducing donors and funded partners to areas of past projects. It continues to generate positive community relationships and is another way for us to give back, to make a difference and allows our partners to see the impact of their donations within a community.

In October, we presented the second **United By Song** in an evening that allows the importance of the United Way programs to be conveyed by storytellers that have firsthand knowledge of the success of our programs.

Through the Community Fund and its restructured delivery model we were able to provide funding to 10 projects.

Equally as important are the new initiatives developed in 2019 to provide internal strength to our organization.



In 2019, thanks to the generosity of donors like you, the United Way of PEI was able to provide funding and support to **10 programs from 8 organizations across the Island**. The impact of these programs is reflected in the many inspiring personal stories of resiliency, recovery, and transformation.

## | ABEGWEIT FIRST NATIONS: THE ABEGWEIT MI'KMAQ YOUTH ACHIEVE STRATEGY

A community-based, partnership-driven strategy that engages youth and community stakeholders in the development of programs, activities and initiatives designed to ensure youth have what they need to be **healthy and successful**.



Approximately **60 YOUTH** were reached through the development of the strategy and its programming/activities on a weekly basis.



**75%** of youth in the community participated in the development of the strategy.

## | PEERS ALLIANCE: PEI QUEER YOUTH COLLECTIVE

The PEI Queer Youth Collective offers the Island's only community-based youth group specifically for LGBTQ2+ youth (ages 12 to 18) and their allies. The program offers a low-barrier social support system designed to promote **community connection, community leadership, resiliency and psychosocial well-being** for participants, with group meetings currently held in Summerside, Tignish and Charlottetown.



**78 YOUTH** engaged with the PEI Queer Youth Collective Program from Sept 2019 - March 2020



**95%** of program participants report that the program helps them connect with the broader LGBTQ2+ community



**80%** report that the program helps them make new friends and maintain friendships

## REACH FOUNDATION: REACH FOR THE STARS

An innovative and intensive after-school program for youth in junior high that provides activities and supports for students experiencing **mental health and addiction challenges**.

## CNIB: RETHINK RECREATION

Recreational activities and programs are provided to **Islanders with vision loss to help increase their quality of life**. Participants are offered the opportunity to gain skills and develop meaningful relationships, with the goal of decreasing feelings of isolation and depression.

## SIERRA CLUB: WILD CHILD FOREST SCHOOL

Wild Child provides opportunities for kids to get active in an unstructured outdoor environment with trained facilitators. Activities support healthy child development by **encouraging prosocial behaviours, improving coping skills, increasing confidence, enhancing emotional development and promoting outdoor physical activity.**

## BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF CHARLOTTETOWN: KID FOOD NATION

Kid Food Nation is a food skills initiative, designed for kids aged 7-12 years, which aims to help improve food skills and support healthy eating habits by empowering and educating kids, parents and families to **develop practical knowledge and experience related to planning, preparing and cooking healthy meals and snacks.**

## BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF SUMMERSIDE: THE NUTRITIONAL BREAKFAST PROGRAM

The Nutritional Breakfast Program operates **Monday-Friday from 6:30am - 8:30 AM** year-round, providing children with a healthy, hearty breakfast, physical activity, time with friends, and homework support. Members also receive transportation to the club and school, along with healthy food for their lunches if needed.

## BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF SUMMERSIDE: GOLDEN OPPORTUNITIES

Golden Opportunities provides kids from low-income families who are unable to participate in traditional team sports the opportunity to play at no cost. Participants receive **training, play against other teams, and experience a sense of belonging, all while enhancing mental health and having fun.**

The PEI School Food Project focuses on providing healthy local meals in schools and food education opportunities, while making sure all families can **access high quality, healthy school food through a “pay-what-you-can” model.**



# SHARING STORIES OF IMPACT

## Speaker's Bureau

The United Way of PEI's Speakers Bureau project was created to combat pervasive negative stereotypes and promote educated dialogue around the community implications and costs of poverty and social exclusion.

In summer 2019, we worked closely with **7 individuals** involved in United Way funded programs to empower them to share their personal stories as part of a speaker's bureau. Each participant worked on developing a presentation that reflected their personal experiences and identified issues important to them. Presentations were delivered to community groups and workplaces in a way meant to help educate, inspire and ignite local change.

Participants were provided with opportunities to develop leadership skills, communication tools, and confidence required to contribute to increasing the diversity in community leadership.

# COVID-19 EMERGENCY RESPONSE

Throughout the pandemic, the United Way of PEI collaborated with local government, other funders, and the community sector to ensure there were no gaps in essential services or emergency needs unmet, while acting as a trusted partner in administering government funding to those most in need.

When the pandemic first became a reality in March, the United Way of PEI responded quickly by partnering with the 11 United Ways across Atlantic Canada to launch the Atlantic Compassion Fund.

## I \$250,000

The Province of PEI invested \$250,000 into the Atlantic Compassion Fund based on the United Way's experience and ability to quickly adapt our investment process to meet immediate needs and we are grateful for the numerous individuals and businesses who have since contributed to the fund.
