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CEO & PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In writing this message, we have been reflecting on the fact that it's been yet another "unprecedented" year. Just as we were beginning to adapt to a new and fundamentally changed world post-pandemic, our Island was hit with Post Tropical Hurricane Fiona, and United Way's experience as a fundraiser, grantmaker, and systems connector was once again put into action. **Together with the support of our partners — government, corporate, individuals, and agencies — we directed emergency funds to those who needed it most, connected Islanders to available supports through our 211 service, and convened the community sector to identify longer-term supports required.**

Through this response, we never lost sight of the need to address the underlying systems that maintain inequities and leave many Islanders behind. Our province is facing high rates of inflation, food insecurity, and a housing crisis. More and more, people are relying on charitable organizations to help fill the gaps between their income and their basic needs. In addition to providing funding, United Way of PEI is working to strengthen the community sector by developing strong leaders through our new ED Academy, and by providing training to staff and boards in areas such as program evaluation, governance, and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

All of this work has been guided by our new strategic plan, which is built on a foundation of organizational excellence. It maintains and strengthens our roles as a funder, convener, and trusted advisor, and pushes us to be bold in our approach to increasing revenue and bringing people and resources together to respond to our community's greatest and emerging needs.

Your donations have powered this work and supported a network of local social service agencies, together reaching over 26,000 Islanders in the past year. Thanks to the commitment and leadership of our board of directors, staff, donors, volunteers, and entrusted community partners, United Way of PEI will continue to advance equity and find the best ways of uniting people and resources to meet immediate needs and find long-term solutions to the challenges facing our Island.

From everyone here at United Way of PEI, thank you for all that you have done to strengthen this place we call home.

PEERS Alliance: PEI Queer Youth Collective

The PEI Queer Youth Collective is a **low-barrier social support initiative** designed to promote community and social connection, community leadership, resiliency, and psychosocial well-being among 2SLGBTQ+ identified youth and youth allies. The Black Cultural Society of PEI: BPOC Peer Support Program

The Black Cultural Society of PEI's BPOC Peer Support Program offers **mental health support for PEI's Black and People of Colour communities**, while simultaneously **running an anti-stigma campaign** around mental illness within BPOC communities.



Native Council of PEI: The Reconciliation and Healing Initiative

Reconciliation and Healing will bring offreserve Indigenous women, youth, and 2SLGBTQ+ community members affected by residential schools and poverty **together to provide group healing activities, Elders support, and education on traditional practices and intergenerational poverty,** and will raise awareness of the NCPEI programs and services available to end poverty.

BGC Prince County: Nutritional Breakfast Program

The Nutritional Breakfast Program operates Monday - Friday from 6:30 AM - 8:30 AM year-round, **providing kids with a healthy breakfast, physical activity, time with friends, learning and mentorship opportunities, and homework support**. The Club also provides transportation to and from the Club and school, along with healthy food for lunches when needed.

BGC Charlottetown & Montague: Great Futures Bursary Program

The Great Futures Program **aims to remove financial barriers and provide high-quality educational, social, and recreational based programming to kids ages 5-14**, regardless of household income. The aim is to introduce kids to their communities, instill the value of giving back, and showcase the value of being part of a community.

PEI Literacy Alliance: Ready Set Learn Program

The Ready Set Learn program **provides one-to-one tutoring during the summer to children in grades K-6** who are enrolled in English, French, and EAL language programs. Ready Set Learn is the only free Island-wide tutoring program for children ages 5-12 who struggle in the areas of reading, writing, and math.

PEI Family Violence Prevention Services: Healthy Minds, Healthy Lives Program

Family Service PEI: Increasing Access to Mental Health Services

Family Service PEI **provides mental health counseling to Islanders** regardless of their ability to pay. United Way funding supports the ability to provide fee subsidies and waivers to low-income clients, ensuring barrier-free access to mental health support.

My therapeutic niche is trauma therapy. It is not a band-aid solution or a quick fix, but an opportunity for lasting change in the lives of individuals. When clients make the decision to resolve trauma the process is raw, vulnerable, and incredibly rewarding. It has been a great relief knowing that even if unexpected financial barriers show up in the lives of clientele, it does not mean that their healing process needs to be halted, prolonged, or rushed. By offering these fee waivers you are investing in the belief that people can change their circumstances. I have had the privilege of witnessing individuals who received your funding recover from addictions, escape domestic violence, embrace their gender identity, shed their shame, and accept themselves as they are. It is a remarkable journey to be a part of and I sincerely thank you for breaking down financial barriers to ensure that opportunity for healing is more equitable. Thank you!

Big Brothers Big Sisters PEI: Teen Mentoring Program

The Teen Mentoring Program matches elementary school children with teen mentors weekly throughout the school year, providing the opportunity for participants to build confidence and form new positive, healthy relationships. The program helps encourage achievement at school while engaging in a variety of fun and educational activities.



211 PEI has continued to grow over the past year, helping even more Islanders navigate the complex network of social, community, and government services available across the Island.

HURRICANE FIONA RESPONSE

When Hurricane Fiona devastated the Island in September of 2022, the United Way of PEI was there to meet the immediate needs of Islanders and assist with **community recovery efforts.** Thanks to funding from the Government of PEI and generous donations from Medavie Foundation, Enterprise Rent-A-Car, CIBC, The Mutual Fire Insurance Company of British Columbia, and individual donors, United Way of PEI provided \$565,782 to 40 community organizations able to get support into the hands of individuals who needed it most.



The United Way of PEI believes it is our role to lead by example as it relates to diversity, equity, and inclusion strategy implementation. We strive to model this work in every aspect of our organization, including in the support we provide to our community. We strive to be a model of diversity, equity, and inclusion.

OUR COMMITMENTS



Increase and grow diversity in our committees, volunteer groups, board of directors, and staff.



Fund, steward, and build the capacity of organizations that have inclusion and diversity as a core part of their mandate.



Support and educate agencies and communities to grow their DEI capacity through workshops, training, and sharing resources.



Ensure the voices of our communities are heard, and that the cultures of all community members are respected.



Working with businesses, organizations, and agencies to promote the value of PEI's diverse communities through education and engagement opportunities. Our progress over the past year:

• We guided **13 staff members** from our funded partner organizations through a **6-month intensive DEI cohort** for the purpose of strengthening their internal capacity to navigate DEI challenges.

 We conducted 130 individual DEI 1:1 sessions with funded partners and community organizations. Additionally, we delivered
4 DEI community workshops to funded partner organizations.

• We have made an **intentional effort** to ensure that our board and staff demographics **reflect the diverse community we serve.**

• We have engaged in **learning opportunities** internally to continue to grow the individual capacity of our staff and board. These initiatives include workshops, 1:1 DEI coaching support, and a book clubin partnership with United Way Halifax.

• We have joined **United Way Centraide Canada's Diversity Council** to **promote DEI initiatives** across the United Way network.

• We partnered with the **PEI Rape and Sexual Assault Centre** to produce a **podcast on gender-based violence awareness** as it relates to members of marginalized community groups.

• Our staff **participated in special advocacy days** by attending community events like the PEI Pride Parade, Women's Network PEI's International Women's Day celebration, the Red Dress Walk, various Black History Month events, and more.

• We created a **Diversity Library** for staff, board, and funded partners to help with accessing **DEI resources**.

• We have **developed our own internal** Land Acknowledgement and introduced a process to include the sharing of current Indigenous events and new Indigenous knowledge learned by staff as standard practice before meetings and events. This work is so important, and I can already feel the impact on how our organization is going to make decisions going forward. There are a lot of trends in nonprofit spaces toward actions that feel like 'equity and justice on a surface level', and I feel like we are discussing things on a deeper level that will provide better results for the families we serve. There is so much to do, and this intentional program and the space it creates to openly talk about these things is very necessary and so helpful already.

ED ACADEMY: COACHING, MENTORSHIP & TRAINING FOR NEW EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS

The United Way of PEI is very excited to have developed a coaching, training, and mentorship program for new Executive Directors in the not-forprofit social sector. The goal of "ED Academy" is to help develop advanced leadership skills and provide a supportive network for those who are stepping up to lead.

ED Academy is a 12-month program that is being facilitated by leadership coach Sara Roach-Lewis of SRL Solutions. The program includes online training models focused on fundamental leadership skills such as strategy and governance, financial management, human resources, and communications. Participants of ED Academy will also benefit from monthly group coaching and mentoring sessions with valuable opportunities to network with others in similar roles.


