POVERTY

KIDS & YOUTH

MENTAL HEALTH

We work to bolster essential services for people struggling with mental health and addiction challenges, helping Islanders access affordable, barrier-free mental health and addiction supports when, and where, they need them.



SOCIAL INCLUSION

We work to create a **healthy**, **caring**, **inclusive community** where everyone experiences a sense of belonging and connection to one another, regardless of their race, income, gender or how they identify.

LOCAL IMPACT: OUR 2021 FUNDED PROGRAMS

In 2021, we were able to make a difference in the lives of more than 10,000 Islanders thanks to your support!

Through our Community Investment Grants, we provided funding and support to 9 local organizations across PEI. The impact of these programs is reflected in the many inspiring stories of recovery, growth, and transformation.

PEERS Alliance

The PEI Queer Youth Collective is a low-barrier social support initiative designed to promote community and social connection, community leadership, resiliency and psychosocial well-being among 2SLGBTQIA+ identified youth and youth allies. Group meetings are currently held in Summerside and Charlottetown.

BGC Summerside & Wellington

The Nutritional Breakfast Program operates Monday - Friday from 6:30 AM - 8:30 AM year-round, **providing kids with a healthy breakfast, physical activity, time with friends, learning opportunities, and homework support.** The Club also provides transportation to and from the Club and school, along with healthy food for lunches if needed.

Big Brothers Big Sisters PEI

The Teen Mentoring Program matches elementary school children with teen mentors weekly throughout the school year, providing the opportunity for participants to build confidence and form new positive, healthy relationships. The program helps encourage achievement at school while engaging in a variety of fun and educational activities.

Blooming House

The First Step Program helps women navigate services such as housing, mental health and addictions, transportation, and community programming, while also developing practical life skills, in order to minimize the risk of chronic homelessness and find long term solutions.

Abegweit First Nations: The Abegweit Mi'kmaq Youth **Achieve Strategy**

The Abeqweit Mi'kmaq Youth Achieve program provides youth from the three Abeqweit communities with a safe place to gather. Programs are designed to support youth engagement in cultural activities and provide youth with the skills and support needed to be healthy and successful.

Our funded partners are required to measure program impact. Besides funding, we provide them with mentorship, training and support to help ensure success.

Throughout my year as Resource Coordinator, there has been one client that consistently had an impenetrable guard up. I recall last fall she told me she was going to the methadone clinic. When I congratulated her, she snapped at me that she "wasn't quitting anytime soon, don't get any ideas". In May of 2021, she was hospitalized, and I consistently showed up to see her week-after-week. I worked so hard at building a relationship with her and began to notice those walls around her starting to crack. In August, we had a huge victory when I brought up the topic of methadone again and this time, she decided she would give it a real shot. In September we secured housing for her, and she has been settling really well into this new way of living.

Family Violence Prevention Services

The Life Skills and Job Readiness Program at Anderson House provides women and youth staying at the shelter with important tools and resources needed to promote independence, in turn helping to break the cycle of abuse and homelessness.

Sierra Club

The Wild Child Forest School Program provides opportunities for kids to get active in an unstructured outdoor environment with trained facilitators. Activities support healthy child development by encouraging prosocial behaviours, improving coping skills, increasing confidence, enhancing emotional development, and promoting outdoor physical activity.



211 PE

is a **signature service** of the United Way of PEI, provided in partnership with the Government of PEI.

211 helps Islanders access and navigate programs and services for both everyday needs and times of crisis.

When a caller dials 2-1-1, they are connected with a skilled and empathetic Community Resource Navigator (CRN) who takes the time to listen and helps them connect with the right program, service or support for their own unique situation. CRNs ensure callers are eligible for a program or service prior to making recommendations.

211 PEI also has a website, www.pe.211.ca, that provides users access to all the programs and services in the 211 database. The website is continuously updated to ensure the most accurate and up-to-date information is available on all programs, services, and agencies.
